

The month of September is dedicated to the Seven Sorrows of Mary. Devotion to the sorrows of the Virgin Mary dates from the twelfth century, when it made its appearance in monastic circles under the influence of St. Anselm and St. Bernard. The Cistercians and then the Servites undertook to propagate it. It became widespread in the fourteenth and especially the fifteenth centuries, particularly in the Rhineland and Flanders, where Confraternities of the Sorrowful Mother sprang up. It was in this context that the first liturgical formularies in her honor were composed. A provincial council of Mainz in 1423 made use of these in establishing a "Feast of the Sorrows of Mary" in reparation for Hussite profanations of her images.

In 1494 the feast appeared in Bruges, where the Precious Blood of Christ was venerated; later on it made its way into France. It did not, however, become widespread in France before Benedict XIII included it in the Roman Calendar in 1727 and assigned it to the Friday before Palm Sunday.

Some Churches had previously celebrated this feast during the Easter season. Others, however, celebrated the Joys of the Blessed Virgin during the Easter season, as is still done today at Braga. In some places it was entitled "Recollection of the Feasts and Joys of the Blessed Virgin Mary."



International Service Awards

Whether ongoing or one-time initiatives, these programs embody the spirit of the Order and serve as an inspiration for all Knights of Columbus.

Culture of Life Activities

Blessed Trinity Council 15181
Dawson Springs/Princeton, Kentucky
Open New Pregnancy Center with Ultrasound

As Knights and as followers of Christ, we are committed to the defense of life at all its stages. Members of Council 15181 in Dawson Springs/Princeton, Kentucky, answered the call to build a culture of life when they learned that a local pro-life pregnancy center wanted to reach more people by opening a satellite center in the small town of Eddyville. The Knights immediately pledged their support and, after a site was chosen, went to work renovating the new facility. Once the satellite office was operational, the council raised enough funds to enable the pregnancy center to purchase a 3D ultrasound machine, valued at \$15,000. The funds were supplemented through the Supreme Council's Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative, which has helped place more than 950 ultrasounds in clinics. After the machine was installed last spring, Bishop William Medley of Owensboro blessed the center and machine. PGK George Barber, now District Deputy of District 6, attended the Supreme Convention in Baltimore as a guest of the Supreme Board of Directors to accept the Award on behalf of his Council.

The chart above is as accurate as the data Supreme has released through Knightline and a document on awards adjustment. The good news is three additional Councils achieved Star Council status following the adjustment. At least two were the result of a District Deputy filing a request with Supreme to review their records. As a recap 36 Councils earned 39 Supreme Awards for FY 2017-2018. Of the 13 Star Councils there is one Triple Star, Council 390; two Double Star, Councils 13053 and 15841 and ten Star, Councils 6368, 6743, 12852, 14604, 15181, 15452, 15525, 15914, 15979 and 16179. Congratulations to the Grand Knights and Members of the 36 Councils that worked to earn the awards.

HOW TO CONDUCT A CHURCH DRIVE

It makes sense to look for new members in the place you're most likely to find them — your parish. One efficient and proven way to do this is to hold a Church Recruitment Drive. Here are steps to success for your event.

1. The Preparation Phase

Get permission from your pastor to hold a Church Recruitment Drive Weekend after all Masses.

Contact your council's field agent to get his assistance.

Advertise the drive in the parish bulletin.

To order supplies for your next Recruitment Drive, officers with access to Officers Online should log in, click the Supplies Online link, and search under Kits.

Organize your members into teams for the drive weekend. Make sure that enough council members are committed to covering each Mass.

Conduct a First-Degree Ceremonial within one week of the recruitment drive. If necessary, use the First-Degree Video Production available via Officers Online.

2. The Implementation Phase

Arrange for a membership recruitment announcement to be made before or after Mass.

Have members, wearing Knights of Columbus branded apparel so they are easily identified, positioned at the entrances of the Church or other appropriate area, to talk to prospects about joining and help them complete a *Membership Document* (#100) or a *Prospect Card* (#921A) if he'd rather learn more about the Knights before filling out a Membership Document.

3. The Follow-Up Phase

Within 48 HOURS, council members must contact every prospect who completed a *Membership Document* (#100) or expressed interest in joining during the Implementation Phase.

Inform prospects of the date, time and location of the open house and invite families to attend as well. Also, let them know the date, time and location of the First-Degree Ceremonial.

What Your Council Needs for a Church Drive

To make your Church Recruitment Drive a success you will need the right tools. Here is a quick guide to what every council might need to have on hand for their recruitment drive:

Membership Document (#100):

This is what it is all about: getting those prospects to sign up and join you as brother Knights. Next stop — the First Degree, and then your prospects and their families can start being active within your council.

Prospect Cards (#921A): These 3"x5" cards will help your council collect the contact information on prospects who are looking for more information on your council before completing a Membership Document.



[Membership Recruitment and Retention Manual \(#10237\):](#)

Finding potential new members for your council can be as simple as reaching out to the members of your parish. An announcement by your pastor or a fellow Knight at the end of each Mass on a given weekend, or once a month, is one of the most effective ways to encourage men to join your council. To assist your council in putting together a message to your parish, please consult the *Membership Recruitment and Retention Manual* (#10237). This booklet includes an announcement that should be customized to reflect your council's activities as well as some suggestions on follow-up activities.



Two months of the fraternal year have passed. Twenty-Six Councils produced an intake of 52 members for the Jurisdiction through the end of August. Congratulations to the recruiters. Twenty-One members were lost through suspension or withdrawals. One third, eight, of the Districts comprised of 28 Councils have not had an increase in their member rosters during the past two months.

October traditionally is one of two church drive months. October is in honor of our patron Christopher Columbus and March is in honor of our founder Venerable Fr. Michael J. McGivney. Now is the time to gear up to plan and conduct the October drive. Supreme has developed a comprehensive plan to conduct an effective drive. I have enclosed a copy of the plan. **An addition to the plan is to have information on hand so a prospect could immediately register as an eMember and subsequently become a member of your Council.**

Supreme Fast Start Contest. A \$600.00 award will be paid to the Jurisdiction if its Councils recruited 25%, 140 members, of the Circle of Honor quota during the period July 1 – September 30. We need 88 more members to be able to add the \$600.00 to the State incentive budget. You can make it happen. Congratulations to District 14 Councils and District 6 Councils for being the top District in the State contest for July and August respectively.

It was an honor to represent the Commonwealth of Kentucky as a Delegate to the 136th KofC Supreme Convention in Baltimore this past month. I thank you for having the confidence in all of the State Officers to be present and gain knowledge and experiences that help the Kentucky Councils serve our parishes better. The highlight of the convention for me this year was seeing DD#6/PGK George Barber and his wife Sharon accepting the **International Culture of Life Award** for Council #15181 - Blessed Trinity at the awards banquet. Congratulations to all that helped make the project and recognition possible.

As of August 29, we currently have 20 councils showing as not having a **form #185**, "Report of Officers Chosen" for the new fraternal year turned into Supreme. With 6 Suspended Councils, that leaves 14 that I will be helping to get this important report in. Please contact your District Deputy or myself if you have any questions.

For the "**Service Program Personnel Report**", form #365, which was due by **August 1st**, we have **51 councils to go to reach 100% submittal**. This form is important for Supreme to be able to send valuable training tools, and enable online access to safe environment training.

Thanks to all councils who have turned in the "**Semiannual Council Audit**" form #1295 that was due **August 15th**. If your council is still working on this important report and have questions, please contact your District Deputy or myself.

The KY Jurisdiction is committed to help councils setup and report "**Parish Roundtables**" on form #2629. We currently only have **11 roundtables reported for our State Council**. Please help our Parishes by implementing a Roundtable in each Parish your Council represents. Questions? Contact your District Deputy or a State Officer.

Response for councils filling out the Partnership Profile Report with "**Special Olympics**" form #4584 has been slow but it is not too late to fill out this important report especially since Special Olympics is celebrating their 50th Anniversary this year.

The Grand Knight, Program Director, Community Director and Family Director for each Council is required to have completed the **Safe Environment Training** courses administered by "Praesidium" for the Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus. There are 3 short courses to be taken via internet (hard copies are available if necessary). The Family and Community Directors also need to have background checks (no charge) thru the Supreme Council. Please look for email notifications from Praesidium in your "inbox" or "spam/junk" folders for assigned username and password to complete this important training. There is no cost for this training/check.

If compliance is not met within the 30 days of notification, it takes some more steps to start the reappointment and reissue of username and password process over again. If you are one of the positions for your council mentioned and have not completed **ALL** the courses, please take time and do it now for your council.

Please try to attend one of the State Regional Meetings to be held September 8, 9, 15, and 16. If you miss the one for your diocese, you can always go to one of the other meetings. Check the KYKofC.com September Calendar for locations and further details.

The State Deputy has ask me to check into obtaining the services of a tax expert for some overall guidance on recurring questions about Kentucky State Sales Tax for the jurisdictions' councils. I will have a report at the Regional Meetings to help with this overall guidance about council fundraising activities from a qualified tax expert.

Councils should donate the food to a local food bank following the drive. When your drive is complete, please notify me or the State Deputy and report out on how much food was donated and to whom the donation was made. The State Deputy will use this information to report out on the success of our unified program in the name of Charity. I urge every council to make this one of your first programs that you run this year. The next unified State programs are Novena for Life, January 14 – 22, 2019, and Special Olympics, March 18 – 24, 2019. I will send out more information on these as we get closer to these dates.

By now, you should have your program calendar complete for the year. Plan all of your activities and be sure to include the Mandatory Programs from “Faith in Action”. These are required for a council to be awarded the Columbian Award or the Star Council Award. If you have any questions or need any help, consult your District Deputy or feel free to contact me. Let’s make this year the best ever for your council.

As always, remember to use every program as an opportunity to invite a fellow Catholic gentleman to join the Knights of Columbus. Invite a friend to join us and be part of the programs your council has to offer.

In the summer of 1873, as a young seminarian in Canada, he was forced to leave theological studies and return home to aid his family after the sudden death of his father, Patrick. "He was reeling," it says in his biography *Parish Priest*. "He packed his belongings, knowing that he would never return to Sainte-Marie, and went home."

"Money for tuition was no longer available," the authors continue. "Even if the McGivney family could survive without Michael's financial support, it was not clear that he could survive without help from them — or someone." Michael was able to continue his studies only after receiving a scholarship from the then-Diocese of Hartford.

Less than a decade later, as an associate pastor at St. Mary's Church in New Haven, Conn., Father McGivney was faced with an all-too-similar situation.

One of his parishioners, Edward Downes Jr., was forced to quit the seminary after his father died unexpectedly. He returned home to New Haven to support his mother and 12 siblings.

In those days, the court had the right to assign children to public institutions if it had reason to believe that their families could not properly care for and support them. Unless they were represented by a financially secure guardian in court, the teenage Downes boys would be removed from their family.

On Feb. 6, 1882 — the very same day as the first meeting for what would become the Knights of Columbus — Father McGivney appeared in court to stand as guardian for Edward's brother Alfred. The court accepted, yet Father McGivney was frustrated by the recurring nightmare of financial hardship.

"Even though he was only a young man," *Parish Priest* says of Father McGivney, "he was filled with a lifetime of anger and frustration at the sense of doom that settled over nearly every family that lost its wage earner. ... On the afternoon of February 6, he was more determined than ever that what had happened to the Downes family need not happen to anyone else."

The Mission Begins – And Continues

In that spirit, Father McGivney set off with “entrepreneurial zeal” to found the Knights of Columbus. In his own words, Father McGivney wanted the organization to “to unite the men of our Faith throughout the Diocese of Hartford, that we may thereby gain strength to aid each other in time of sickness, to provide for decent burial, and to render pecuniary assistance to the families of the deceased members.”

He knew what life was like without that assistance. The initial system of “life insurance” designed by Father McGivney was a simple one, a pass-the-hat system through which each member could help support his brother Knights.

As the organization grew council by council, state by state, and country by country, so too did the insurance program. The pass-the-hat system was transformed into one of the largest and most highly rated life insurance programs in North America.

The Knights of Columbus has passed many milestones and received many accolades along the way: \$100 billion of life insurance in force, 40 consecutive A++ (Superior) ratings for financial strength from A.M. Best, 14 consecutive years of sales growth, and designation as a 2015 “World’s Most Ethical Company,” but all that is secondary.

What matters most is that we continue to fulfill Father McGivney’s mission of offering and providing financial protection for Catholic families. 2015 is not 1882. Times are different. Laws are different. Economies are different. But even for those families who may have slightly more than next-to-nothing, insurance protection can be the difference between getting by and getting evicted. In its role as the premier Catholic life insurer, the Knights of Columbus continues to provide a valuable and noble service.

That’s why we offer life insurance.

It’s not for the \$8 billion in annual sales volume, or the \$100 billion in force, or the 2 million policies on the books. It’s not the amount that counts, but the impact of those dollars.

It’s the homes saved, the college tuitions provided, the Catholic funerals paid for and the families shielded that create the legacy of protection that would make Father McGivney proud.

It’s those things that are the hallmark of the Knights of Columbus Insurance program.
