Knights of Columbus Founder Beatified

Below is an article printed in the Nov. 5th edition of the *Paducah Sun. Written by David B. Snow.* District Deputy George Barber contributed to the article.

PRINCETON — Michael J. McGivney, the founder of the Knights of Columbus, is one step from sainthood, having been beatified during a ceremony Saturday, the day before All Saints Day, at the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Hartford, Connecticut.

With the beatification, McGivney (1852-90) will be recognized as "blessed." There are only 11 saints from the United States.

According to the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, there are three steps toward sainthood.

In the first step, the bishop of the diocese where the person died is responsible for starting the investigation into sainthood, examining the candidate's life, works and virtue.

The second step — which McGivney recently attained — is beatification. That requires a verified miracle attributed to the candidate's intercession. When the miracle is verified, a decree is made and the pope grants beatification, giving the candidate the title of Blessed.

The final step is canonization, in which the candidate is made a saint. That requires a second miracle attributed to the intercession of the candidate. Once a candidate is canonized, he is considered a saint.

For McGivney — a Catholic priest who established the charitable organization in New Haven, Connecticut, in 1882 — the miracle recognized by the Vatican came in 2015 and involved a baby that was still in utero and suffering from fetal hydrops, a life-threatening condition that usually would have called for an abortion.

The baby is Mikey Schachle, who is now 5 years old. His parents, Dan and Michelle Schachle of Dickson, Tennessee, prayed to McGivney to intercede with God to save their child.

The National Catholic Reporter stated on July 29 that the Vatican announced on May 27 that Pope Francis met with the board of directors of the Knights of Columbus in February and signed the decree recognizing the miracle.

George Barber, the Knights of Columbus Kentucky District 6 deputy who represents councils in Princeton — which includes Dawson Springs and Eddyville — as well as

Hopkinsville, Oak Grove and Fort Campbell, said that beatification is a rare event and was a great honor for the Knights of Columbus.

"Father McGivney would be the first American-born parish priest to be canonized, and he is the first one to be beatified," Barber said. "We're talking about parish priests as opposed to missionaries."

The Knights of Columbus is an organization made up of Catholic men with a focus on doing charitable works and supporting the church.

"One of the reason the Knights of Columbus was started is to take care of families, particularly those who have lost a breadwinner,"

Barber said. "Basically, it's a group of Catholic men who have come together to strengthen their faith, support their parish and do charitable works in both their parish and in their community."

Barber said that members of the Knights of Columbus are very proud of its founder's beatification.

"It's a big thing for us," he said. "We think it validates the Knights, it validates our purpose and recognizes the charitable work and the support and growth in faith that can be attributed to Father McGivney's original vision of organizing the Knights of Columbus."

Adapt and Overcome

On November 2nd, Council 762 in Lexington was set to hold their first in-person meeting since COVID-19 disrupted everything. 30 minutes before the scheduled meeting time, they were informed that they would not be able to meet in their usual location.

Rather than canceling the meeting, the Council sprung into action and adapted. They held their meeting around the outdoor fire pit while wearing masks. Approximately 20 men showed up despite it being cold outside.

They recited the rosary and followed that up with their meeting. Well done!

In Memory of District Deputy George Daniels



George Thomas Daniels reached peacefully for the hand of God on November 10, 2020. He was a dedicated servant of his Lord and Savior.

George Thomas Daniels was born 9/12/1948 to HavyIn Daniels and Bertha (Craig) Daniels in Louisville, KY. He graduated from Fairdale HS 1966, Associate Degree in Business Management from JCC/UK. He was drafted into the US Army in June 1969, served in Vietnam from June 1970 to April 1971, 10 month's and 22 days too long, so he said. He reenlisted with the US Army Reserves 100th Division in 1973 and proudly served another 20 years, retiring with the rank of SFC.

He married Recka (McCauley) Daniels, the love of his life, on July 1, 1972, whom he met shortly after returning from

Vietnam in 1971. She stood with him hand in hand for more than 48 years.

He truly loved his daughter Kimberly and was so very proud of her accomplishments. His son-in-law Randall Tan is a great husband and father to his daughter and grandchildren. His heart was full of joy for his granddaughter Ruth.

He retired as a machinist from Naval Ordnance Station Louisville, KY (NOSL) the only inland shipyard in the US from 1969 to 1995. He then worked at Leggett and Platt in Simpsonville KY for 7 years, as a tool and die technician.

He was a member of St. Jerome Catholic Church, which was merged and renamed St. Teresa of Calcutta Catholic Church for more than 30 years.

He was a 4th Degree member of the Knights of Columbus Council 14474 and Assembly 3228. He served as District Deputy from 2018 to 2020. He served on the Bullitt County Planning and Zoning Board from 1990 to 997.

Those he loved, he loved deeply and loyally, and would help anyone in need.

His parents preceded him in death as well as Maternal Grandparents Clyde and Goldie Craig, and Paternal Grandparents Elliott and Virgie Daniels. Also preceding him in death was his sister HavyIn "Bea" (Daniels) Flaherty, his in-laws, James Bernard and Doris McCauley.

Surviving him is his loving wife and love of his life, Recka (McCauley) Daniels. Only daughter Kimberly (Daniels) Tan (Randall) of Kissimmee, FL, of whom he was very proud. He was "Poppop" to his beautiful, amazing, loving granddaughter, Ruth Tan, and very very soon to be grandson Matthew Tan of Kissimmee FL. He is also survived by his sister Theresa (Daniels) Cox (Jim), Crestwood, KY. He was also survived by his niece Amanda Satterly, and several great nephews.

Secretary's Report:

The NMB-1 Invoices for the period Jan 1, 2020 thru June 30, 2020 went out around July 27th, 2020 via email. To date I have received payments from 36 of 40 councils that were billed or 90.00%.

The results of my internal audit revealed that there were 13 councils that had not paid their FY 2019-2020 NMB-1 fee & 15 councils that had not paid their NMB-2 fee for FY 2019-2020. The unpaid fees amounted to \$605.00 dollars. To date I have received payments from a number of councils leaving a balance of \$40 for NMB-1 & \$70 for NMB-2 for a total of \$110.00.

There were 12 councils that had not paid their FY 2019-2020 Per Capita dues amounting to \$6,372.50. Six councils still have not paid their past due Per Capita leaving an unpaid balance of \$3,282.50. I have sent emails to all of the council GKs & FSs with a copy of the past due invoice. I will be contacting the councils personally in the near future.

Reflections:

Our Founder Fr. Michael J McGivney is now and will be forever after known as "Blessed Fr. Michael J McGivney". What a special honor for a special Priest. While the Beatification Mass was beautiful, for me the true beauty came in the form of the Schackle family. I watched with pride as they approached the altar. My heart swelled as the Cardinal bent down to greet Mickey and then again as the family presented the relic to the congregation. **FAMILY**...That's what **IT'S** all about! That's what we are supposed to be all about.

State Deputy Announces New Incentive for All Councils!

Currently only 23 of the 97 active Councils in the state qualify:

The state is at 89% Compliance for Form 185, 64% for Form 365, and 71% for Form 1295. Our biggest need for improvement is in Safe Environment Training, where we are only 48% in compliance. Most of that is from Councils who have not submitted Form 365s and have not documented Brothers in the positions of Program Director, Community Director, or Family Director. I know that several people have had problems with the Safe Environment Training software. I've communicated that to Supreme, but I don't expect much help. Please work with your GK, DD, and me if you can't get it to work.

We're slowly making some progress, and I appreciate the GKs and DDs who have been working hard during this pandemic period to get those Forms in even though the business of the council may not be proceeding as usual! You don't want to miss out on this incentive! Recruit! and Retain!

We're up to 20 Councils Who have initiated new Brother Knights so far this year, despite the pandemic. 3 Councils have already exceeded their annual new membership quota, led by St Edward the Confessor Council 15841 in Jeffersontown.

Feel free to ask your District Deputy, the State Officers, Field Agent, or our Regional Growth Director for assistance in recruiting!

Curia 1975. The Knights of Columbus presence in "Northern Kentucky" consisted of seven councils. They are Bishop Carrell Council 702, Bishop Mulloy Council 1301, Fr. Kehoe Council 1764, Fr. De Jaco Council 5220, Msgr. Ahmann Council 5227, Boone County Council 5453, and Msgr. Lehr Council 6337. The seven Councils were instituted in 1903, 1908, 1914, 1962, 1962, 1963, and 1972, respectively. Bishop Carrell Council 702 along with Louisville Council 390 and Lexington Council 762 are the charter Councils of the Kentucky State Council which was instituted in 1903.

Two of the Councils have since merged with other Councils. During 1998, Msgr. Ahmann Council 5227 merged into Bishop Carrell Council 702. And during 2016, Msgr. Lehr Council 6337 merged into Bishop Mulloy Council 1301. Boone County Council 5453 changed their name to Bishop Ackerman Council during 1993 to honor the seventh Bishop of the Diocese of Covington – Bishop Richard H. Ackerman.

With this article I have included a picture of the seven 1975 Grand Knights. Four of them are still on the rosters of their respective Councils and all have fifty years or more of service. Thomas O'Donnell, Council 702, fifty-five years; William Theis, Council 1301, fifty-two years; Ray Kentrup, Council 5227/702, fifty-nine years, and Dick Zirkelbach, Council 5453, 50 years.
