

Passing of State Chaplain, Fr. Mario Tizziani

State Chaplain, Fr. Mario Tizziani went to be with our Lord on December 26th, 2020. Below is his obituary.

Father Mario Joseph Tizziani, passed away on Saturday, December 26, 2020 at Carmel Manor in Ft. Thomas, KY.

He was born April 8, 1954, in Steubenville, OH to Lino John and Catherine Gabriel Tizziani. A 1972 graduate of Toronto High School in Toronto, OH, he proudly served in the U.S. Navy, then later graduated from Liberty University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in education. He spent fifteen years teaching elementary, middle and high school in Jacksonville, FL, where he was named Regional Teacher of the Year in 1999. Later, he pursued a doctorate degree in history from his beloved Ohio State University. On June 23, 2006, he was ordained as a Catholic priest in the Diocese of Covington, KY.

Father Mario was installed as Pastor of St. Cecilia Roman Catholic Church in Independence, KY on August 10, 2008. In 2015, he received the Distinguished Pastor Award from the National



Catholic Educational Association. From 2016 to the present, he was a Chaplain for the State of Kentucky Knights of Columbus. On July 10, 2017, he led in the groundbreaking of a \$5.5 million expansion including a gymnasium at St. Cecilia Catholic School until it's completion in 2019. In October of 2018, under his leadership, St. Cecilia School was named a Blue Ribbon School. Toronto High School named him a Distinguished Alumni in September of 2019. Father Mario was also instrumental in the success of St. Cecilia's annual Labor Day Festivals during his tenure.

His father, Lino John Tizziani, nephew, Jason Joseph Motto, brother-in-law, Tom Anderson, and Uncle Gino Tizziani, all preceded him in death. Those left to carry on his legacy include his mother, Catherine Gabriel Tizziani of the Laurels in Steubenville, OH; sisters, Gina (Joe) Motto and Esther Anderson of Toronto, OH; brothers, Dan (Maggie) Tizziani of Toronto, OH and Anthony (Lisa) Tiziani of Conklin, NY; many nieces, nephews, great nieces and great nephews. Father Mario also leaves behind his beloved cat, "Miss Kitty", his "kids" at St. Cecilia School, and the parishioners at St. Cecilia, who were all part of his extended family.

A visitation will be held Wednesday, December 30, 2020 from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. with a vigil service immediately following at St. Cecilia Catholic Church, 5313 Madison Pike, Independence, KY 41051. A second visitation will be held Thursday, December 31, 2020 from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. with a Mass of Christian Burial at 10 a.m. at St. Cecilia. Due to the current Covid restrictions, face masks must be worn, social distancing is encouraged, and 50% capacity will be limited in the church. Chambers and Grubbs Funeral Home in Independence is assisting the family with local arrangements. Memorials in lieu of flowers may be made to St. Cecilia School and St. Cecilia Catholic Church. Services and interment schedules in Toronto, OH have not be set at this time, but will be arranged through J.E. Foster Funeral Homes and Crematory (www.jefosterfh.com). I first met Fr. Mario as I sat in the crowd of attendees at a State Meeting. You could tell from his addresses and prayers that he was a fervent supporter of the Knights and intensely dedicated to helping us grow our faith.

As a member of State Council, I got to know him much better, spending time with him at the Hospitality Room between business meetings at the State Convention and traveling with him to the Supreme Convention. One of my strongest memories of Fr. Mario will be attending the Mass he said for us in one of our hotel rooms in Baltimore. It was a special moment, being in a small group of devoted men and women with a great liturgist. It made me think of the early Christians celebrating the Mass in their small clandestine groups. Father opened up about events at his parish (good and bad) when he talked to us. and I once got to attend Mass at St. Cecilia and observe him praying with the congregation before Mass. I could see that he was much loved and appreciated by his parishioners and he served them with conviction, integrity, and love, even in adversity when he stood as a firm moral compass for his floc.

When you got to know him, you found out that he also had an amazing sense of humor, and he always had an extra capital prize ticket for the St. Cecilia summer festival that he was.

I was fortunate to be able to attend his funeral Mass and say farewell. Bishop Foys was brought to tears when he talked about Fr. Mario and his interaction with children – a side of him I didn't get to see but can easily believe.

State Chaplain Fr. Mario Tizziani will be remembered as good friend to the Knights who loved to serve the Lord and His people. He will be sorely missed.



A Tribute to Fr Mario

Born April 8, 1954 – Died December 26, 2020...

Son, brother, student, college graduate, served in the Navy, Regional Teacher of the Year, Doctor of History, Ohio State Fan, Priest, Pastor, Administrator, Brother Knight, State Chaplin and friend. It's easy to sum up someone's life in just a few words. You know when he was born. When he died and what he did in between. You might say "Wow...he did a lot in his 66 years", and then you move on with your life. But for those of us that had the opportunity to meet Fr. Mario Joseph Tizziani he was much more. There is no telling how many lives he touched in his life time. From his childhood friends, to his grade school, high school and college classmates to the men and women he served with in the Armed Forces...spending 15 years as a teacher, cheering on his beloved Ohio State, celebrating a common bond with his fellow priest and clergy, serving his local and state Knights of Columbus families. I could make the case that over his lifetime Fr. Mario Joseph Tizziani touched thousands of lives if not more.

But for me, Fr. Mario was not only a friend, but a spiritual leader that spoke the truth and spoke of the love of God. I remember very clearly his message to the District Deputies & State Officers at a meeting in Princeton, KY a few years ago. He was very disturbed about the media reports of accusations concerning abusive actions by the clergy. He didn't hold back, he told the truth. He acknowledged that some reports were true and he humbly apologized for their actions and he asked that those of us present pray for those priests and to ask God's forgiveness. Whenever Fr. Mario addressed his brother Knights at a State meeting he always spoke of the love of God and how we as Catholic men need to pray for the "Soul" of our country. He was very concerned about the evils that are happening all around us. One of his favorite prayers is the "Anima Christi". He talked about how he taught it the children at St. Cecilia Catholic School.

As busy as he was, I believe he looked forward to his weekends away whenever the State Convention, State Organization & Mid-Year meetings came around, not to mention the Supreme Convention. These gatherings gave him an opportunity to relax and "let his hair down a bit". For those few short days he was able to share the many photos of his beautiful

nieces and nephews, talk lovingly about his mother and siblings. He talked about being in love with a young lady while in college and how difficult it was because he also felt God calling him in a different direction. As State Chaplin, Fr. Mario was always invited to the Supreme Convention and he always looked forward to it. The Supreme Convention offered him the opportunity to meet and be with hundreds of priest, bishops, archbishops and cardinals from around the country and the world. To see Fr. Mario process in with his fellow clergy before each mass was humbling and exciting. He always had a big smile on his face. And when it came time for the Delegates Dinner, he really had a good time. I believe he sang along with practically every state song that was sung...his two favorites...Ohio and Kentucky not to mention Florida, Georgia, Alabama, and on and on.

I thank God for giving me the opportunity to be an alter server those many years ago as a young boy, because those lessons learned still serve me today. It was my honor & privilege to assist him at mass, whether it be in a hotel room or in a convention hall. Fr. Mario loved his Italian heritage and he loved to talk about it. He told me once that he has a great uncle that was also a priest...Fr. Romano Bottegal who served in Lebanon and who has the distinction of being known as Blessed Fr. Romano Bottegal. So many stories and so many memories, Fr. Mario Joseph Tizziani...you'll be missed!

2021 Salute to Summer Games

Last year Knights of Columbus across Kentucky combined to raise or donate more than \$6,800 to support Special Olympics as part of the program's Salute to Summer Games event after the COVID pandemic forced the cancellation of the Games.

This year, the Summer Games will return in June, but before that the Salute to Summer Games will also return as a Knights of Columbus-specific event. Our goal will be to raise more than \$10,000 (a little less than \$1 per Knight in the state). If we reach that goal, the Knights will be recognized as gold-level sponsors of the Summer Games. The fundraiser will be very easy to manage and will be 100% remotely done. And the goal is easily attainable should even as few as two Knights per council take part.

The Salute will run from April to June. Look for more information coming from the State Deputy soon.

He would not hesitate to call you out for something you did. Fr. Mario was that kind of friend. He would tell you what you needed to hear, not always what you wanted to hear. Mid-Year Meeting:

Thank you to those that took time to attend the Mid-Year meeting. The State Deputy announced that all councils will receive a 50% reduction in their 2020 State Per Capita billing and that there will be no New Member billing for the period July 1, 2020 through December 31, 2020.

For those councils that are current with their forms and State financial obligations, they will be eligible for an additional 50% reduction in State Per Capita. The deadline is January 15, 2021.

Secretary's Report:

The NMB-1 Invoices for the period Jan 1, 2020 thru June 30, 2020 went out around July 27th, 2020 via email. To date I have received payments from all but 2 councils.

There are 2 councils remaining that have not paid their FY 2019-2020 NMB-1 fee.

There are 4 councils that have not paid their FY 2019-2020 Per Capita dues.





2021 Resolutions

I have sent a letter to all GKs reminding them that councils have until March 15th to submit resolutions for the 2021 State Convention. At the Convention, the delegates assigned to the Resolution Committee will review them and make recommendations to all the Delegates at the Business Meeting. Each Resolution will be open for discussion and voted upon. Those Resolutions that deal with matters beyond our Jurisdiction will be submitted to the Supreme Advocate for consideration at the Supreme Convention.

Last year, Council #2282 presented a Resolution supporting a "Paid for Life Dues" program that the Board of Directors took under consideration for further discussion. We'll see if we hear anything about it at next year's Supreme Convention.

5 more Councils brought in new members in December, but halfway through the year that only brings us up to 34 of 96 Councils recruiting so far. We're up to 29 (from 20 last month) Councils which have initiated new Brother Knights so far this year, despite the pandemic. 5 Councils have already exceeded their annual new membership quota, led by St. Edward the Confessor Council 15841 in Jeffersontown.

Our State Deputy Steve Zanone put it succinctly – councils are finding a way to grow and do the work of the Order serving their members and their parishes. His marching orders – FIND A WAY! Whatever works best for your council.

If each Knight asks 4 men a year to join the Order, and only one of them says "yes", you'll still double the size of your council. If you don't ask, you don't grow. Be sure to use the new eMembership as a tool to get men to take the first step toward full membership.

sure you are too! I urge you and your fellow Sir Knights to work with your Assembly leaders to get your activities back on track. If you have any questions, or need any help, please let me know.



History Report

Council History Update January 2021

Over a quarter century of Kentucky State Council history has slipped into the past and for the most part gone unrecorded since the first, and only, history book, cover shown, was published in 1993. The information submitted by the participating Councils was either particularly good or rather skimpy.in content. Some Councils did not submit any input to the project either through lack of interest or for financial reasons. The cost was \$225.00 per page to print the article. I was Grand Knight of Council 7847 at the time. We did not have the money to participate. The book had been a dream since the late 1970s. It took another 23 years to bring the book to fruition. The late George M. Schrode, PSD and longtime state newspaper editor authored the book. The hardbound 128-page book made its debut at the 90th State Convention held in



Covington. Charles "Carl" Biery was State Deputy. The book price was standard edition \$48.00 and leather edition \$84.00.

In 1993 the State Council consisted of 56 Councils and 8,300 members. The last Council included in the book is Msgr Thompson Council 10988, Calvert City. Since then, the number of Councils has grown to over 100 and members exceed 12,000. So, there is a lot of history to catch up on.

This is the third plea for this historical data. I recommend each Council appoint a historian to research and submit their input for a new edition to our history. Send the articles to me and I will eventually bind the histories in a loose-leaf binder. I expect this to be a long-term project. Cost of the book will be minimal to cover cost of printing and binding. The State Council may underwrite the cost.

Since I asked for the update in 2018, I have received 11 new or updates from Councils 1055, 5453, 7847, 10263, 10987, 11470, 12352, 12923,12965, 15914, and 16232. Thanks for the updates.
