

My Brother Knights,

We are nearing the end of the first quarter of our fraternal year. So far, we have had a very good year. Thanks to your efforts, we currently are at the top of the leaderboard in our region! Congratulations, and thank you for your work. Our incentive program is set to end on September 30. However, if we reach 100 new members in the jurisdiction for the month of September, we will extend the \$25/ member incentive. We will examine other incentives at the conclusion of this program.

I would like to take this opportunity to review some of the items we discussed at our regional meetings. We revisited the concept of the power of one. Some of you may remember the video from some years back. One member, per council, per month. For many of our councils this should be easily done. One member per month is a total of 12 new families in that council. Some of our small councils may not be able to get one member every month, but maybe they get one every other month. That is still a big increase. We continued our theme of the Power of One in our discussion on charity. If every member donated \$.01 per day, \$3.65 per year, the result would be staggering. A total of \$45,625! There are very few members who cannot afford to contribute \$3.65 per year. Currently we are in desperate need of donations to our Culture of Life funds. We will not be able to have a significant impact in this area without them. We also discussed the importance of getting our forms submitted to the Supreme Council, and completing our Safe Environment training. I have taken the training, and it is not difficult. It takes about an hour and a half. Many people complain that they have completed training in their diocese and do not understand why we need to do a separate one for the Knights. The simple answer is because every diocese has a different training and differing standards. The Knights chose a

program that meets our standards. The training is not hard, and I found it to be a good refresher course for my diocesan training. Please complete it as soon as possible.

Brothers, please keep up the good work. We are off to a strong start, but this is not the time to let up. Keep your council active and doing good works. Use your activities to recruit. Use the resources available to us. Your State officers want you to succeed. We want you to be the "go to" group in your parish. We are not using Covid as an excuse any longer. Covid may alter how we do our work, but it will not stop us from our work.

"I put no value on my life if only I can finish my race and complete the service to which I have been assigned by the Lord Jesus" (Acts 20:24, from Paul's farewell to the presbyters of Ephesus, at Miletus.) The reflection offered by our Supreme Chaplain, Archbishop William Lori, in the most recent issue of Columbia, put me in a reflective mood. I, too, have wondered at how much Blessed Michael McGivney had accomplished in his short life, as I have also noted in the celebration of this memorial or that feast the relative youth of so many saints through the ages. Like Archbishop Lori, I recognize that I am headed toward the "finish line" of my parish assignments. At 64, I can hope to complete this term as pastor at St. William and St. Sylvester, but I wouldn't expect to be asked to take on another parish. (Take care when you assume!)

However, I have doubts whether I will be able to "complete the service" needed at my little congregation of St. Sylvester, to wit, the building of a new church since the foundation of the present structure has been judged structurally unsound. Like our supreme chaplain, I wonder what I have accomplished, how family and friends (and parishioners) will remember, or (most importantly) what divine judgment I will face. To put it another way, have I made a difference in the lives of those around me? As a Christian, have I contributed to the Kingdom of God here on earth?

Last week I had the opportunity to discuss with one of my nieces her plans for college as she finishes her senior year in high school. It turns out that she will graduate with a high school diploma and an associate college degree! Her sister is visiting colleges in the beginning of her junior year. It seems that young people these days have accelerated lives. My (baby) brother, who has already seen three sons through college, is looking down the home stretch toward an "empty nest." I can still remember holding these girls in my arms as infants. Tempus fugit, indeed!

Secretary's Report:

Those that attended the July Organizational Meeting heard the good news that the traditional New Member Billing that occurs in July and January has been eliminated. I am happy to report that all past due NMBs have been paid.

Unfortunately the same cannot be said about the Past & Current State Per Capita Billings. We still have 3 councils that owe a total of \$1,340.00 for the FY 2019-2020 and 8 councils that owe a total of \$2,136.25 for the FY 2020-2021 for a combined total of \$3,476.25.

Emails were sent to all Grand Knights and Financial Secretaries on 8/31/21 notifying them of the past due amounts and asking them to submit payment. It's important that these bills are paid to prevent a council from falling further behind.

How's the new membership incentive going you ask...well it may be too early to say, but the numbers for July & August look promising? In July, 5 councils welcomed 15 new members and in August, 22 councils welcomed 41 new members, for a total of 56 new members.

Congratulations to Council 7847 in Hopkinsville on bringing in new members for both July & August.

Brother Knights,

Covid 2.0?

The Regional Meetings are underway, and I'm hoping that you'll take advantage of the more normal conditions and meet with us in person while we still can. Kentucky is seeing an increase in the numbers of people infected, and I wouldn't be surprised to see the return of some of the restrictions we had to suffer through earlier in the Pandemic. Consider using these more relaxed times to plan for how your council will do business and prosper through a potential return of restrictions.

Council Forms

- Form 365, the Service Program Personnel Report was due 8/1. As of 9/2 Supreme reports that 40 councils have not yet submitted this form. This is important so that new Program, Youth, and Family Chairmen requiring SET qualifications can be notified and other Chairmen can get important information and training.
- Form 185, the Report of Officers Chosen for the Term, was due 6/30. As of 9/2, Supreme reports that 20 Councils have not submitted this Form. This is important so that new Grand Knights requiring SET qualifications can be notified and other Officers can get important information and training
 - If you haven't had elections or have some empty offices, please submit new forms 185 and 365 with last year's names or blanks and change them later.
- Form 1295, the Semiannual Council Audit Report, is due 8/15. As of 9/3 Supreme Reports that 78 councils have not submitted this form. Of those 78, 20 are two or more audits behind, and 8 of those are 2 or more years behind. Councils who miss consecutive audits are loose the \$5K bond that Supreme provides for Treasurers and Financial Secretaries revoked.

SET Compliance

The GK, Program Director, Community Director, and Family Director of each council are required to take KofC provided Safe Environment Training. The four positions must be filled by at least 3 people and the Community and Family Director positions must be filled by different people. As of 9/2, Supreme reports that only 37% of the positions requiring Safe Environment Training have successfully completed it. Be sure to check your junk mail if you're in one of these positions and haven't gotten a link to your training yet!

Recruit! and Retain!

28 councils have initiated new Brother Knights so far this year, despite the pandemic. We've brought in 77 new members and those councils are benefitting from the \$25/new member incentive from our generous State Deputy! For now, it's only good through the end of September, so take advantage of it. Ask someone you know at Church to join the Knights this weekend – and every weekend! We've been asked to bring in one new member per month per council, and we can do it!

If each Knight asks 4 men a year to join the Order, and only one of them says yes, you'll still double the size of your council. If you don't ask, you don't grow. Be sure to use the new eMembership as a tool to get men to take the first step toward full membership. Feel free to ask your District Deputy, the State Officers, or our Regional Growth Director for assistance in recruiting!

State Deputy Jewel Symbolizes His Office

The State Deputy's jewel is an adaption of the emblem of the order and an astrolabe, which preceded the sextant as a navigational instrument.

The emblem of the order has been separated into its two basic parts – the knight's shield and the Maltese cross – and is connected by the astrolabe.

Thus, we have the idea of Catholic knighthood bound together by the state deputy.

The shield with its mace, anchor and sword and the letters "K of C" represent the Knights of Columbus as engaged in organized merciful action.

The state deputy's title is on the bar across the shield. In the center of the cross is a white circle representing eternity with the letters T.F.M.M. inscribed. In the center of the circle is a profile of Christopher Columbus, our patron.

Across through the arms of the cross are two swords representing our readiness to defend our country and our faith.

The astrolabe was an instrument for taking altitudes of celestial bodies from which time and latitudes are

determined. It dates back to 240 BC and may be called the oldest scientific instrument in the world.

By the time Columbus made his voyage in 1492, the instrument has been developed into a somewhat sophisticated piece of equipment.

This instrument is used on the state deputy's jewel to symbolize that, just as Columbus placed his trust in it, we place our trust in this officer to guide the order through both strife and serenity and to promote the spirit of Columbianism in every phase of its members' lives.

The jewel is suspended from a red ribbon about the neck of the State Deputy while in office.

This article is an extract from the State newspaper VOL 1 No 5, September 1965. Since 1903 through today, 58 members have served as State Deputy for the Kentucky Jurisdiction. We have 14 living Past State Deputies along with our current State Deputy, Steve Zanone.


