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

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BROTHER KNIGHTS HELPING THEIR COMMUNITIES

Last Sunday, Father David Kennedy had good reasons to cancel the 10am Mass at Resurrection parish in Dawson Springs, Kentucky: The church building's structure was unstable, and his parishioners were dealing with devastation from five tornadoes that hit western Kentucky and surrounding states Dec. 10 and 11.

But in the end, he did celebrate the Mass when parishioner Larry Fannin — grateful that only his barn had been damaged — drove to Father Kennedy's house 15 miles away, in

Earlington, as soon as the downed trees were cleared from his road.

"The tornado went all around his house and didn't kill him," said Father Kennedy, who also pastors Immaculate Conception in Earlington and Holy Cross in Providence. The most powerful of the tornadoes destroyed Resurrection's 51-year-old church and part of Dawson

Springs as it cut a path of death and destruction more than 200 miles long and a mile wide through western Kentucky and two other states. The tornado missed Earlington by a half mile and didn't reach Providence, Father Kennedy said.

"It was just [Fannin] and me having Mass for the whole parish," the priest said. "Nobody else could be there, and, of course, we couldn't be at the regular church. It was so special."

The loss of a church doesn't compare with the storm's toll of more than 90 lives — including 77 in Kentucky — the highest tornado death toll in the state's history. But Father Kennedy and his flock, along with thousands whose loss of homes and other buildings is now believed to be in the billions, are considering the path to recovery.

The tornadoes that hit the region that night struck hardest in the communities of Dawson Springs, Bowling Green and Mayfield in the Owensboro Diocese. As search-and-rescue efforts continue and crews work to restore power, gas and water, Catholic Charities and other organizations are working to meet residents' basic needs.

Throughout this week the diocese of 20,000 Catholics has received thousands of calls and donations from around the country, including many cards and letters from Catholic schoolchildren, while it has also sought to meet Catholics' spiritual needs during the crisis. Owensboro Bishop William Medley declared Friday a day of fasting and prayer for the

tornado victims and plans to fly over the diocese with the Blessed Sacrament on Tuesday.

As the diocese's Catholic Charities office continues to help with immediate needs for food and shelter, they are distributing supplies coming in and looking ahead at providing longer-term housing assistance, said Susan Montalvo-Gesser, director of the Owensboro Diocese's Catholic Charities office, who noted that some residents need more help because they lack insurance.

Both Bowling Green and Mayfield each lost more than 500 homes, she said. "We don't have a number of the people who were displaced," Montalvo-Gesser said. "We don't have a complete number of all the people who were lost yet, who are dead, and that's hard."

Temporary housing is available in Mayfield, located in western Kentucky with 10,000 residents, but some are reluctant to leave their homes, even if they're not structurally sound, in fear they will be looted, she said. All of the hotels and state park cabins in a 40-mile radius are full.

As she has visited the most affected areas this week, Montalvo-Gesser said she has tried to offer some normalcy to kids who have experienced this trauma.

In Mayfield, St. Joseph parish's church bell tower and sanctuary were damaged but overall the church survived, said Tom Lilly, diocesan chancellor and chief administrative officer. A nearby church building was lost, but it may have protected the church from further damage, he said.

Deacon Chris Gutiérrez has spent much of the week shuttling between diocesan offices in Owensboro and Mayfield, which has strong communities of diverse parishioners. He said he has reached about 40 families.

His main goal has been bringing supplies and connecting with agencies families still in their homes who don't speak English and may not know assistance is available. Some are indigenous Mayan Guatemalans who may hesitate to seek help because they are undocumented, he said. Their homes may be damaged, but they stay because they fear they will be looted.

Parishioners from St. Joseph parish brought water, coats and personal hygiene items, Deacon Gutiérrez said. "That first contact had been very important in reaching out to them."

Dawson Springs, about 75 miles northeast of Mayfield, also suffered destruction and loss of life, but fewer people have been displaced, Lilly said. In an area of the town of 2,600 not affected by the tornadoes, the parish's Knights of Columbus council and other charitable organizations are offering aid at a local school.

Father Kennedy, who has been pastor since 2015, is already receiving contributions for rebuilding the church; but in the meantime, he will offer Mass for Resurrection parish in a parishioner's converted weight room. The church's altar, ambo, tabernacle and other items were rescued and moved to the space, which can hold some of the parish's 28 families, he said.

As Stephen Zanone traveled through the area this week, he couldn't reach Dawson Springs, which was closed off. But the Knights of Columbus Kentucky state deputy reported that many Knights councils in his jurisdiction are providing food, distributing supplies and other assistance.

Zanone also met a fellow Knight severely impacted in the disaster. I was "looking a brother in the eye who lost everything, handing him a \$100 gift card and giving him a hug and telling him that that's just the beginning. ... He knows that we're going to be there for him. We're there, and we're going to continue to be there."

The outpouring of assistance has been overwhelming, said Zanone, adding that, so far, the Knights have raised \$100,000 for relief, including \$10,000 of the Kentucky jurisdiction's funds.

Also, the Knights' Supreme Council has donated \$100 Mastercard gift cards. "I'm fielding text messages and Facebook messages about where is the need, how many people do we need to send, what do we need to send and where? We will be boots on the ground, and we will be helping people not only clean up, but we're committed to helping as much as we can with the rebuilding process in many instances."

While there is a surplus of some supplies, Zanone and his fellow Knights are beginning to send out specific requests, such as for Christmas toys, he said.

Supplies are coming in, but the problem is getting them to the people who need them, Deacon Gutiérrez said. "A lot of help is trickling in in spots but doesn't mean that a good segment of the community is being reached."

The diocese is receiving calls, letters and donations from around the country, Lilly said. As of Friday, it had received \$950,000 from 2,100 contributors, including \$250,000 from Catholic Charities USA.

"The amazing thing is most people who are calling in to help are people who've experienced disasters themselves," he said. "It's a lot of people who went through Hurricane Harvey and went through Hurricane Sandy and went through floods or disasters of their own — and they remember, and they know how long it takes to recover."

Catholic schoolchildren continue to send letters and cards that are distributed to families in need. On Friday, the Owensboro Catholic schools delivered 1,200 letters, Lilly said, adding that he encourages the schools to write rather than send donations.

Lilly emphasized the importance of intentional prayer. "We're begging to coordinate efforts of intentional prayer for these communities because they are devastated."

Along with prayer, Knights from Kentucky and other locations will be ready to help with cleanup and rebuilding as soon as FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) and insurance adjustors have gone through the damage sites.

In three to six months, there will be a need for cleanup and rebuilding help and additional funds, Montalvo-Gesser said.

What tornado victims don't need right now is bottled water or clothes, she said. A monetary

donation best helps to reach needs. In Mayfield, propane stoves, heaters and generators are needed. Visa or Mastercard gift cards, gas cards from Walmart, Murphy USA or Kroger are helpful, as are Dollar General cards, Montalvo-Gesser said.

Other needed items include flashlights, baby food, matches, lighters, long underwear, underwear, gloves, socks and personal items.

Life is moving fast for those impacted by the tornadoes, but those in Mayfield are motivated by Gospel values, Deacon Gutiérrez said.

"Jesus is calling us to be his hands and the feet, and the words and the comfort, for others right now; and this is where everybody's at. Nobody's hesitating about giving any number of hours without sleep or even caring for themselves to care for others — and that has been just amazing."

BISHOP MEDLEY BLESSES HIS FLOCK FROM ABOVE

The story below is a reprint of a story entitled "Flying over western Ky., Bishop Medley provides unique blessing to his people impacted by tornado outbreak" written by Elizabeth Wong Barnstead and published on https://westernkycatholic.com/. Bishop William F. Medley wanted to bless his people who had been in the path of the tornadoes that struck western Kentucky during the night of Dec. 10, 2021, and with the help of a local pastor, some Knights of Columbus, and an airplane, he did just that.

On Dec. 21, the bishop flew over the southern regions of the Diocese of Owensboro with a monstrance containing the Blessed Sacrament, blessing all below who had been impacted by the tornadoes.

A week before, the bishop had driven 400 miles to visit the affected locations, including Resurrection Parish in Dawson Springs, St. Joseph Parish in Mayfield, the Princeton area and the Bowling Green area.

But seeing the damage from above, "it is a different perspective. A God's-eye view if you will," he said. "It was staggering to see what happened to people's lives and knowing all that would have to be rebuilt."

The Eucharistic fly-over idea was initiated by Daniel Schachle, the general agent for the Knights of Columbus insurance program for Tennessee, Kentucky, Arkansas and small part of Virginia. He has his pilot's license and Piper Archer plane, and did a similar fly-over blessing for the Diocese of Nashville after tornadoes struck the region in early 2020.

One of his field agents, Leonard Walther, belongs to St. Joseph Parish in Bowling Green.

"Daniel called me and said hey, do you want to see if we could do this for the Owensboro diocese with the bishop?" said Walther in a Dec. 22 phone call with The Western Kentucky Catholic.

He talked with his pastor, Fr. Ryan Harpole, who contacted Martha Hagan, the diocesan vice-chancellor and assistant to Bishop Medley.

The bishop agreed to the idea immediately, and the flight was scheduled for the following week.

The plane took off around 11:15 a.m. from Mid America Jet in Owensboro as Bishop Medley led a prayer for a safe flight, asking for the intercession of Our Lady of Loreto, one of the patrons of airplane pilots and aviation.

(Coincidentally, the feast of Our Lady of Loreto is Dec. 10 - the date of the tornado outbreak.)

They flew over Madisonville first, where parishioners and volunteers at Christ the King Parish and School had set up a community resource center in the gym to help the displaced and suffering.

Lifting the monstrance to his window, the bishop prayed aloud that "our Holy Mother would watch over them and guide them in the ways of goodness and truth." Fr. Harpole said the monstrance was borrowed from Gasper River Catholic Youth Camp and Retreat Center just outside of Bowling Green, since the small size was better for traveling in the small private plane.

The harsh paths of destruction were evident from the air. Often the first sign of a tornado touchdown was a thick column of smoke from debris being burned. After the smoke, either lines of flattened trees and buildings, or rows of roofs covered with bright blue tarps, indicated that a tornado had come through the area. The bishop gave a Eucharistic blessing while flying over Dawson Springs, Princeton and Mayfield. He also led a benediction for the inmates while flying over Kentucky State Penitentiary in Eddyville, because "those men deserve a blessing too." Bishop Medley held the monstrance against his window and prayed "may God bless them and give them grace."

The plane returned to Owensboro around 2:30 p.m.

Schachle, who resides in Dickson, Tenn., said a tornado had passed near his family's home but the house was fine. (Besides hitting Kentucky, the tornadoes also dragged across Arkansas, Tennessee, Missouri and Illinois.)

"There are no words that can cover" helping Bishop Medley bless the diocese in this unique way, said Schachle.

Schachle himself is no stranger to powerful spiritual experiences. His youngest son, Michael, was miraculously healed in utero from the fatal condition of fetal hydrops through the intercession of Knights of Columbus founder, Fr. Michael McGivney. That approved miracle paved the way to Fr. McGivney being beatified in October 2020. "It is surreal every time I do this," said Schachle of the Eucharistic fly-over. "I think bringing Christ to the people is the best way I can help.

Walther said this was a "great opportunity," not only for Bishop Medley to "see" his people from above, but to also "bless his people that way."

He added that he is thankful for all the people who have reached out from across the country to help Kentuckians, but "I hope that it continues when all the media has gone."

"We've got a lot of immediate needs met, but people are still going to be hurting in one month, two months, six months and beyond," said Walther.

He pointed out that the steeple and cross – destroyed by the 2020 Tennessee tornadoes – were only just reattached to the top of the Church of the Assumption in downtown Nashville on Dec. 16.

"This is not a short term thing," he said.

A tornado came through just a mile from Walther's home, which was unscathed, but he said some friends were not so fortunate and lost their houses.

"We don't know what's going to come of this all," he said, but "as Catholics, we need people to see that this is what we believe – that we can take from the tragedy and turn it into a blessing."

STATE CHAPLAIN FR. JOHN LIST

"Can a mother forget her infant, be without tenderness for the child of her womb? Even should she forget, I will never forget you." (Isaiah 49:15)

I often find inspiration in the reflections offered by our Supreme Chaplain, Archbishop William Lori, in the latest issue of Columbia, and the most recent issue was no exception. He begins with a mention of the images of the Madonna and child highlighted during the Christmas season. He then draws from the mystery of the Incarnation a timely lesson on the sacred nature of life from conception. He continues with appreciation for the pro-life efforts of the Knights of Columbus and concludes with an encouragement to "accompany" expectant mothers in difficult circumstances "not merely in the short term but for the long haul." I encourage you to read his reflection for yourself in its entirety.

The image that came to my mind with his mention of the Madonna and child was the somewhat more contemporary depiction of the "Madonna of the Streets". When my mother was searching for a statue to be placed in a grotto at our home parish in honor of my father, this was the representation she chose. It speaks not only of the Blessed Mother's tender love for the babe in her arms, but her outward gaze also reflects her determination to face the difficulties ahead. At least, that what it seems to me to project.

The same combination of loving tenderness and steadfast determination is apparent to me in the outpouring of support for the victims of the December tornadoes. Would I be oversimplifying the "Into the Breach" theme to think that this is exactly the kind of faith-in-

action witness called for in today's world? I don't think so. And we carry that spirit on in our communities by prayerfully considering how best to respond to the continuing pandemic- how can I "stand in the breach", how can I respond to the well-being of others? We carry that spirit on in our parishes by prayerfully participating in the Holy Father's call to synodality. We carry that spirit on in our homes by conscientiously practicing our faith, modeling discipleship for our children.

We have re-entered that part of the liturgical cycle called "ordinary". The term is not meant to connote the humdrum or excuse a relaxation of effort. It is so called because the weeks are numbered, as in "ordinal numbers": first, second, third, etc. But the term also comes from the Latin word meaning "rank" or "order", as in, "let our lives be orderly", i.e., purposeful or disciplined.

The first letter to Timothy encourages us to "fight the good fight, hold fast to faith and a good conscience" (1:18-19). This is no time to hibernate, however much the winter cold may tempt us. Rather, with Christ as our head, may we strive to do whatever good we are able.

2021 Resolutions

I have sent a letter to all GKs reminding them that councils have until March 15th to submit resolutions for the 2022 State Convention. At the Convention, the delegates assigned to the Resolution Committee will review them and make recommendations to all the Delegates at the Business Meeting. Each valid Resolution will be open for discussion and voted upon. Those Resolutions that deal with matters beyond our Jurisdiction will be submitted to the Supreme Advocate for consideration at the Supreme Convention.

Form 1295 Semiannual Council Audit Report

The semiannual audit for the period ending December 31st is due February 15th. Supreme is still running behind on processing Form 1295s and asks Councils not to resubmit their forms when reported as not having been submitted because it causes them extra work.

Form 1728 Annual Survey of Fraternal Activity

Form 1728 for the calendar year 2021 is due January 31st. This form is important to help publicize the considerable contributions of your councils and to help maintain our status as a charitable organization.

Safe Environment Training - rules change

The Office of Youth Protection recently issued a clarification on staffing the four positions that require Safe Environment Training (Grand Knight, Program Director, Community Director, and Family Director). While I have been telling you that there must be at least three Brothers in the four positions, the Office of Youth Protection has added that only the Grand Knight can hold two of the positions. I'll be reviewing Council Safe

Environment participation and informing those councils that may need to make a change to be in SET compliance and eligible for the Star Council award.

STATE HISTORIAN BILLY HANCOCK

The Saga of Council 390

Louisville Council 390 was chartered on December 7, 1898, with 78 charter members. The Charter Grand Knight was Matt J. Winn. By 1926 membership had grown to nearly 2,000. They were "dissolved" on October 5, 1935, and their members transferred to the new Bishop Spalding Council 2761 which instituted on July 24, 1935.

Council 390 had at least two "homes" prior to building their final club house on Fourth Avenue in 1926. The club and meeting house cost \$400,000 and furnishings \$50,000. The building committee sold bonds to raise the money. The structure enclosed a theater, bowling alley and a gigantic meeting chamber. I am enclosing pictures showing some of the building's features.

In my opinion, the massive debt incurred to build and furnish their home during the depression era of the 1929 crash was the cause of the Council being "dissolved". Sixty-five years later John L. Harris, Sr. Council 390 was instituted on April 23, 1995, in Valley Station. The Council was short lived as it was suspended April 1, 1998. As of July 10, 2012, there were 12 members listed on their roster. If anyone has any additional information to add to their history, please send it to me.


Another eighteen years passes. Institution of the Father Roy Dentinger Council 16274, Louisville, on July 30, 2016, paved the way for reactivation of Council 390. Thirty-two charter members under the leadership of Charter Grand Knight John McCarthy were off and running.

A state jurisdiction has the option to retain the assigned numbers of suspended or dissolved councils. Since 390 was the first Council number assigned to Kentucky and

dated from 1898, State Deputy Frank Shay felt the need to merge the suspended council with an active one. Council 16274 was instituted during Frank's term as State Deputy. He approached the members with the idea of merging with the suspended John L Harris, Jr. Council 390. Grand Knight John McCarthy and District Deputy Ken Rosenbaum both gave strong support to the merger. The bottom line is the Supreme Board of Directors approved the merger and reinstituted Council 390 with the date the John L. Harris, Jr. Council formed – April 23, 1995. SD Shay stated, "I am very proud of the Council for keeping the 390 number alive and more so for naming their Council after Fr. D". Today, Father Roy Dentinger Council 390, Louisville, under the leadership of Grand Knights John McCarthy and Paul Tadatada has grown to 144 members. Since the merger, to my best memory, the Council has earned Star Council annually. Some of them Double or Triple Star. I'm sure Father D would be pleased with the Council that bears his name.




Exterior of the Louisville Council #390 coancil home, Circa 1930. (Knights of Columbus Sapreme Council Photo Archives.)

SECURITY MEMO FROM SUPREME



To: State Deputies and Vice Supreme Masters

From: Office of the Supreme Advocate

Date: December 15, 2021

Re: IMPORTANT CYBER-CRIME ALERT

- > Suspicious emails are being sent to Knights of Columbus members from bad actors who impersonate State Deputies. You should alert leaders and members in your jurisdiction.
- Safeguard Knights of Columbus membership information.
 - Council and assembly membership directories should have password protection and should be restricted to authorized persons.
 - Ensure that council and assembly membership directories are not available by searching on Google, Bing, Yahoo! or other search engines.

A phishing scheme has been reported where a bad actor -- who pretends to be a State Deputy -- sends an email to Knights of Columbus members asking for gift card purchases to help charities or people in need.

These bad actors are using Knights of Columbus membership lists and information displayed on council and assembly websites and social media sites to send realistic phishing email messages to unsuspecting members.

Protect your members by informing the councils and assemblies in your jurisdiction about this phishing scheme, and make sure that they know how to safeguard Knights of Columbus membership information. For questions or to report a phish, contact our IT Department at servicedesk@kofc.org.

Please study the following tips to help protect against malicious emails, and review the text of an actual phishing scam, below.
