



2022 Salute to Summer Games

<u>Salute to Summer Games</u> is back for a third year and the web site is now active! Once again, with the support of the State Deputy, the Salute to Summer Games has returned as a Knights of Columbus-specific campaign. From now through the 2022 State Summer Games (scheduled for June 4 at Eastern Kentucky University), individual Knights and Councils across the state will have an opportunity to raise money to support Special Olympics with the goal being to add the Knights of Columbus as an official State Summer Games sponsor.

Worthy Grand Knights should have received an e-mail from the State Deputy that outlines a plan for success:

- 1. Identify one or more volunteers to participate
- 2. Set up a team for your Council at sokysalute.com
- 3. Have your participants register as part of your team
- 4. Have participants connect their Salute pages to their Facebook pages

This is a great opportunity for Councils and individual Knights to easily help us support Special Olympics without Councils making direct donations. However, if your Council does decide to make a donation, it can be sent to:

Council donations will appear on the Kentucky Knights of Columbus page on the Salute Web site.

Our goal is to raise \$12,000 (or about \$1 for every Knight in the state). If we are able to raise at least \$10,000 the Knights will be recognized as a Gold Sponsor for the State Summer Games. 2022 Polar Plunge

Knights across Kentucky got the Chill of a Lifetime again in 2022, with three Councils supporting Polar Plunges throughout the state.

With the Lake Cumberland Plunge still to go, Brother Jeff McMahon has been the top fundraising Knight Representing Fr. Roy Dentinger Council #390, Jeff raised \$2,458 this year.

As of this writing, Field Agent Troy Anderson of Chris the King Council #16232 in Scottsville still had a chance to catch McMahon. Anderson had raised \$2,145 with a few days to go before the March 19 event.

In Lexington, Mary Queen of the Holy Rosary Council #14372 raised \$3,766 this year, led by team captain Will Schnurr and Rob Mahle who was the team's top fundraiser with \$890. All totaled, in 2022 Plunging Knights raised more than \$8,400 for Special Olympics this year. Thank you for all the Knights who were Freezing for a Reason this Plunge season.

STATE CHAPLAIN FR. JOHN LIST

As I compose this reflection for our newsletter, I take note that today is the Solemnity of St. Joseph as spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary. I am also reminded by our Supreme Chaplain's monthly reflection in the Vivat Jesus spiritual guide of last Sunday's gospel on the Transfiguration while at the same time considering tomorrow's gospel (from Luke- your parish may be using the gospel from John) about the untimely tragedies befalling "some Galileans", which resonate with the desperate plight of contemporary Ukrainians. What is to be made of our lives, so often in between the triumph and tribulation? Perhaps the humble witness of St. Joseph might give us some perspective. Perhaps Supreme Chaplain Archbishop Lori's admonition is applicable: "We might wish in our own lives for extraordinary experiences or 'spiritual highs,' but... we are not meant to cling to them. Brothers, may we be grateful for these enriching moments..., but remember that we fulfill our God-given mission primarily within the daily duties of our ordinary lives."

Consider the example of St. Joseph- how happy he must have been, to be betrothed to such a wonderful, gentle and holy woman as this Miriam of Nazareth. Surely, he must have been the envy of every other man in that village, maybe in all of Galilee! (Perhaps those of you who are married can remember how you felt when your beloved said "Yes!," even as your knees shook in the asking.) But how must the foundations of his world have shook to discover that this chaste and blameless flower was with child; perhaps not despair, but certainly profound confoundment. Talk about your highs and lows!

And then there was the birth in Bethlehem. Do you remember the birth of your first-born, how your heart almost burst with unconditional love? But then, to be unable to provide her and the child with no shelter but a cave, and that shared with livestock. Do you think it weighed heavily upon Joseph's heart? And then we have the matter of their flight as refugees, repeated 2-3 million times over this month in Ukraine.

Where did Joseph find his peace, what was the reward for his faithfulness? Remember that he never saw one of the miracles his foster son would work, never heard a whisper of the spiritual truth that would reveal Him as the Word. (OK, maybe a whisper if he caught some of 12-year old Jesus' exchange with the teachers in the Temple.) Joseph's subtle satisfaction were the years of quiet accompaniment in the home at Nazareth, perhaps delight in teaching Jesus how to construct a table or chair (no IKEA kits then) or maybe the difference between ripe figs and those that need a little more time. Who knows? Perhaps he and the child took a turn at kneading the dough or some other kitchen tasks to give Mary a helping hand...

Let me close with the conclusion of Pope Francis' prayer to St. Joseph: "Blessed Joseph, to us too, show yourself a father and guide us in the path of life. Obtain for us grace, mercy and courage, and defend us from every evil. Amen."

If you have questions, ask your Grand Knight, District Deputy, or a State Officer. Don't wait!
- Please honor those who have served and worked in your Council this fraternal year.
 write up and send a submittal in to the State Deputy as consideration for Chaplain of The Year, Knight of the Year, and Family of the Year Awards. Please start now, these submittals are due by April 1st.
- Please honor those who worked hard for and during a Council sponsored Faith
 Program Project, Family Program Project, Community Program Project, or Life
 Program Project. These submittals are due by April 1st. It was only a few years ago
 that the Dawson Springs/Princeton/Eddyville Council 15181 submitted a Life Project to
 the State Deputy, and it was later honored as the International Life Program winner.
 Please pick one or all your "Faith In Action" projects from the present Fraternal Year,
 submit to the State Deputy by April 1st.
- Regional and State Free Throw Championships are being held this month.
 Congratulations to all participants and winners.
- Applications for \$100 refunds for Councils giving at least \$500 in support of a seminarian or novice are due at Supreme between April 1st and Jun 30th.

- Nomination committees are to be appointed for upcoming Council Elections. PLEASE volunteer for a Council position based on what you can contribute. Don't worry about what you know or feel you "lack". Your help is needed, and this is your opportunity for your qualities to shine. - Any Catholic man should have the opportunity to learn and be a part of the Knights of Columbus. Please ask them to join us. If you think you don't know why he should or why we do what we do, I will pray that you at least go to the kykofc.com State Council website and the kofc.org website and do a bit of surfing and get a taste of what it is all about. Every Council function is an opportunity to invite men and their family to be a part of...
- Please at least have someone write up a description of your council's best activity and submit to the State Deputy for consideration of an award. If nothing else, it just might be the idea another Council needed to do a program they can handle.

Putting our faith in action during the Lenten season

March arrives and Lent begins on the very next day, March 2. We all know that Lent is the time of preparation for Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday and ends with Holy Thursday. In our preparation to celebrate the Lord's resurrection we are to exercise self-control and self-denial by fasting. We are encouraged to encounter Christ in the reading of Scripture, and we are to serve others by the giving of alms.

When I was a kid, the "go to" self-denial was giving up chocolate...made those chocolate Easter bunnies most tasty! I think a lot of us are creatures of habit when it comes to self-denial. We continue the same path, "giving up" the same things each year. Although self-denial is important as a practice, I've gotten a little older and a bit more introspective. I try to think of positive things to do rather than what I want to give up. Here are some of the things on a personal level that I'm going to try: Devote some time each day to reading Scripture. I'm not going to read whole books or commit to something I can't achieve, but for 10 minutes each day I'm going to read the Bible. I think reading scripture every day is a good habit to nurture.

The second item of National acclaim was spread throughout the entire country with the publishing and distribution of the annual Official Derby Festival Program this April. Mike Peck has much to say about this.


