
























































Council #13053 Coats for Kids

Pathway of Hope Donation

The following is a reprint of an article published in Leader-News November 26,2024.

Pathway of Hope receives donation from Pickin' Life Project's bluegrass music festival

Pathway of Hope Pregnancy Resource Center in Greenville has been awarded \$4,514 from the proceeds of the "Bluegrass on (Lake) Beshear" music festival, a fundraiser supporting life-affirming pregnancy care centers across western Kentucky. The October 12 event, held near Dawson Springs, allocated part of its funds to Pathway of Hope, marking the center as the fifth recipient of this annual charity effort, now in its 11th year. Other beneficiaries include Alpha Pregnancy Care Center in Hopkinsville, Door of Hope in Madisonville, and the H.O.P.E. Clinics in Benton and Eddyville.

The Pickin' Life Project, a nonprofit organization dedicated to promoting the sanctity of life, connected with Pathway of Hope this year through the Knights of Columbus. At the time, the Knights were actively raising funds to help Pathway acquire a new ultrasound machine to expand its cli- ent services.



Half of the \$28,000 needed for the

ultrasound machine was raised through contributions from local churches, businesses, and community members, as well as the Knights of Columbus Beaver Dam Council.

The remaining funds came from the national Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative, a special matching program.

Pathway of Hope's new 3D ultrasound machine features state-of-the-art technology, including high-resolution imaging and sensitive sensors capable of detecting a baby's heartbeat as early as six weeks. Research shows that over 80% of abortion-minded women choose life for their babies after viewing ultra- sound images and hearing the heartbeat.

In addition to its ultrasound services, Pathway of Hope offers a wide range of free support for children and families, both during pregnancy and beyond. The center's team of Christ-centered staff and volunteers pro- vides compassionate, nonjudgmental care.

Lexington's first Safe Haven Baby Box to be dedicated soon

Final preparations are being made for the installation of a Safe Haven Baby Box in Lexington. A ceremonial check presentation took place Thursday night at City Hall.



Lexington Knights of Columbus Councils raised and then handed over to City officials more than \$15,000 to pay for the holding box for newborns. The infants can be given up with no questions asked when a mother or couple feel it would be in the best interest of the child. Damon Sexton with Knights of Columbus says when a baby is first placed in the Safe Haven Box, a 9-1-1 notice sounds.

"Then there's a bassinette that's inside of a temperature-controlled, climate-controlled inside of that box when a baby is put. It's pressure censored and so when they feel weight on the box, then a second alarm, we have a baby," said Sexton.

A third signal comes once the box is closed and firefighters can then retrieve the baby. Sexton said with the third surrender in Kentucky, the response time was 90 seconds in Bowling Green. Lexington's Safe Haven Box will be established at Fire Station 2 in the Eastland area.

Sexton said there are ways to communicate this option for mothers or couples who feel giving up the newborn would be best.

"Put posters in high schools in the state and around health departments and things to notify. So, the marketing part..we're hoping that the City will really jump in on that and I'm sure they will," said Sexton.

There is a significant amount of technology and notification signals included in the drop-off box. Sexton noted it must undergo seven consecutive days of appropriate testing. Sexton added more than two dozen Safe Haven Baby Boxes are now found in communities across Kentucky.

Special Olympics

Thank You

As we prepare to close out the year, I want to take this opportunity to once again say thank you for the Knights' incredible support of Special Olympics Kentucky athletes again this year. Each year that we work together it seems like the Knights' relationship with Special Olympics gets stronger.

A few highlights from 2024:

Knights of Columbus once again provided hundreds of volunteer hours in 2024. Among the biggest drivers of volunteer hours once again was the Knights' involvement at the softball throw venue at the State Summer Games in June. Knights and family members from St. Mark Council #12852 and Mary Queen of the Holy Rosary Council #14372 worked Friday evening and Saturday throughout the day for a total of 250 volunteer hours. Two Knights – Mickey Ward of St. Lawrence Council #15681 and Tom Janoski from Holy Spirit Parish/Newman Center Council #15452 – provided hundreds of volunteer hours on their own as Special Olympics Coaches.

Those volunteer hours resulted in the largest annual donation from Supreme in our history with Supreme sending a check for \$3,600.

Knight across the state raised almost \$28,000 through statewide fundraising activities, including the Salute to Summer Games, Polar Plunges and Truck Pulls. This year 21 Councils participated in the Salute, raising more than \$9,000.

Three Knights groups in Owensboro – Owensboro Council #817, Fr. Connor Council #6101 and Owensboro Assembly #2074 – sponsored the State Softball Tournament as that event made its return to Owensboro for the first time in 17 years.

In all, Knights of Columbus Councils across the state raised or contributed \$34,737.14 to Special Olympics programs in 2024 as of Dec. 15. That includes money raised through all fundraising events, money donated to the state program and money donated to local programs throughout the state. This is the second most that Knights have contributed in support of Special Olympics Kentucky in our history.



Message from KAPID

Merry Christmas!

First the Officers and I would like to thank all of those Councils that have supported KAPID again this year with your Tootsie Roll drives and donations. While donations are appreciated, they cannot replace the Tootsie Roll drive. Some Councils go all out by going to various public venues, such as area Walmart stores, and one Council has been able to continue having roadblocks, but we have seen the number of Councils **not** involved in financially supporting KAPID continue to grow. One Council at their home parish with only 90 families, was able to generate \$350 during their most recent Tootsie Roll drive. If a Council doesn't even try, they will never know what is possible.



This year for the first time, we provided a quad-fold flyer that could be used as a hand out to assist in educating both parishioners and the public on what KAPID does. Councils that used the flyer feel like it was an asset. We only printed 1,000 of these flyers. We have yet to run out, because of an apparent lack of interest from our leadership. If we had needed more, we would have printed more. Obviously, that would have been a waste of money.

On the other side of the coin, interest in KAPID by agencies that work with the intellectual impaired has grown this year and I expect it to grow next year. This year these agencies include some old names as well as some new ones. They include as follows:


These grant request total \$70,098. In 2023 we were able to pay out a total of \$16,200 and we do not anticipate a significant change this year. In 2023, out of 101 Councils, we had 43 Councils that had Tootsie Roll Drives. This totaled \$86,950, of which KAPID kept 20%, or \$16,400. 11 Councils made direct donations to KAPID in the amount of \$3,100. This means that the Councils that had Tootsie Roll Drives provided on average \$2,022, while the Councils that made donations gave on average \$282. This is not to say that donations aren't appreciated and welcome, but only to show how much more successful Tootsie Roll drives have proved to be.

On a different note, our KAPID Treasurer has asked me to remind everyone that the Tootsie Roll drive reports can be found on-line under "Resources/Kentucky-Forms". These forms include the KAPID Tootsie Roll Fund Drives Report and the KAPID Tootsie Roll Funds Distribution Report. Instructions for both forms are available in the same area.

STATE DEPUTY LUKE WILLIAMS



Brother Knights,

The first Saturday in December brought the Kentucky State Council Officers, a large contingent of Kentucky District Deputies, many State Council Service and Program Directors and Chairman, a good showing of Grand Knights, Financial Secretaries and many others who are interested in how all this Knights of Columbus stuff comes together. The 2024 Midyear Meeting was held at the Wingfield Inn & Suites in Elizabethtown.

The 2023 Fraternal Survey of Faith, Family, Community and Life Activities results were reviewed with the Midyear meeting attendees. It was pointed out that for the 2023 charitable disbursements for faith activities reported, Church Facilities and Catholic Schools and Seminaries topped the most given list by our KY Councils. Food for Families had the most disbursements in the family activities reported, and the most charitable disbursements were given to the Physically and Intellectually disabled activities as reported in the community activities. Pregnancy support activities received the largest disbursements for the life activities contributions. I reported that the total reported charitable disbursements for 2023 was \$1.4 million dollars and over 284 thousand volunteer hours of service were performed by our Kentucky Knights of Columbus local councils. This compares with the 2022 reported numbers of over \$461K of charitable disbursements and over 65 thousand volunteer hours. This increase was in part due to two things, the great leadership that our Immediate Past State Deputy Tom Johnson provided to encourage better reporting of the local council activities and that our councils are getting back to pre-pandemic levels of activities. I challenged our District Deputies to

encourage our local councils to collect even more accurate reporting for the 2024 Calendar Year Fraternal Survey. I am encouraging all councils to report so that we have better than the 2023 surveys sent in that equaled 77% of our local councils. There are now a "Council Resource Guide" and a "New Council Leadership-frequently asked questions" documents that will be great reference documents for all of us. Don't think for a minute that just because the link says "new council" that it won't help you. Check out this link and you will see all the resources available at your disposal.

Did you know that there are 27 Catholic High Schools in Kentucky? I am excited to promote a High School Student initiative that will promote service to others and the opportunity to earn a Knights of Columbus cord to be worn at the student's graduation (with the school's permission). The program will be open to boys and girls high school seniors at our catholic high schools and if possible, all the Catholic students who are attending public schools. Details are being worked out now, but more information will be sent out to the District Deputies, Grand Knights and councils as soon as the program details are completed.

2024 Kentucky State Council Black Friday Coats for Kids BOGO (Buy One Get One) Opportunity

We had 17 councils across the state that participated in the Kentucky State Council Buy One Get One (BOGO) opportunity for this year. The total # of cases that will be distributed by KY Councils using the BOGO incentive will be 282 cases or 3,384 coats. These coats were delivered to 5 locations in the Commonwealth... the Louisville area, the Lexington area, the Northern Kentucky area, the Hopkinsville area, and the Beaver Dam/Morgantown area. Overall, in the State, there were 315 cases (3,780 coats) that will be distributed to those in need this winter because of this program.

- "Invite Every Catholic Man in Kentucky to join the Knights of Columbus"
- All 99 Councils in KY be at least 60% or better of your membership growth goal by December 31, 2024.

Here are some of the ways to achieve our membership goals

- Promote recruitment at Roundtable Parishes.
- Schedule Regular Charity/Unity/Fraternity Exemplifications Recruit towards that regular date/ if no candidate, practice the CUF exemplification.
- Have a Church Drive for each Parish (host council or roundtable) to recruit
- Catholic men to join with us. Please let our State Membership Director Tom O'Hagan, your District Deputy or any State Officer to help with a Drive in the coming months. All you have to do is invite them!
- Fishers of Men Renew our culture of invitation.

From the beginning, Father Michael McGivney created a culture for the Knights — a "culture of invitation," in which Catholic men ask other Catholic men to join our fraternity and put their faith in action. And so, they went out and invited others. One by one, council by council, our Order grew.



STATE CHAPLAIN FR. JOHN LIST



"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; upon those who dwelt in the land of gloom a light has shone." (Isaiah 9:1, from the Mass of the Nativity during the night)

As I write this, it is the memorial of St. Lucy, whose name shares the root of the Latin word for "light" (Lux, lucis). As I write this, the news is full of the unfolding new reality in Syria. Will it be for the people, hard pressed to these fifty-plus years, a new dawn, or will their nation descend once more into the tyranny of autocracy?

I speak of these two events in a kind of tandem. We celebrate St. Lucy because she was a virgin martyr; she clung to her faith and her consecration to Jesus through the sacrifice of her life. Perhaps because eyes are considered the channels through which light comes into the body (cf. Matt. 6:22), one legend is that she sought to dissuade a suitor who told her that her eyes sparkled like the stars by plucking out her eyes. She is often portrayed with two eyes on a platter. I know, gruesome, but the point is that she chose to forego earthly security for the ultimate good of eternal life.

As I observe the developments in Syria, my prayer is that the powers that be there now will forego a short-sighted (pun intended) play for political hegemony, a sad repetition of the Assad family example, and fulfill the assurances being given of tolerance for all minorities in their country. It will require an enlightened sacrifice of sorts, a determined self-discipline not to clench with an iron hand the present supremacy. Could there be

such grace in the hearts of Islamic revolutionaries once allied with al-Qaida? One can only hope and pray so, but it would indeed be a light in a land of gloom...

The contrast of light and darkness, so evident in our seasonal transition, speaks to the condition of our lives as well as that of the world. Our celebration of the nativity of our Savior instills in us the hope of a brighter future. But it also prompts within the question of what we are doing to promote that hope, to build that future. Perhaps we participated in the "Coats for Kids". Perhaps we donated to a local food bank at Thanksgiving. But how am I stirring up the "light within"? Often we get so busy with the "doing" that we neglect to tend to the "being". Or maybe that just me.

Every Christmas holds out the invitation to rebirth, the hope of the fullness of life in eternity. Even as we celebrate the birth of the Son of God into our humanity, may we honor his incarnation with a renewed sense of and commitment to "a community of belonging and solidarity worthy of our time" (Pope Francis.) I wish you the peace of the Christ-child.

If you don't believe that God has touched your life or that Jesus Christ hasn't called you to serve, then I ask...What do you believe?



Membership

State Deputy Luke Williams has our recruiting so far this year as "sluggish". At the end of November, we're 42% through the fraternal year. Less than a quarter of our councils have reached 42% of their Quota.

The great news is that 6 of our 99 active councils have already met or exceeded their New Member quota!

The good news is that 48 other councils have recruited at least one new member this year. Which leaves the very disappointing news that 45 of our councils have yet to recruit a new member. Still, that's 10 fewer than last month.

The State is 39 new members behind where we should be at this point. At this rate, we'll be 80 members under our State Quota of 500.

How do we make that up?

There are 99 active Councils in the state. There are 323 Parishes in the state. That gives us over 200 opportunities to grow the Order!

We have a 3 part plan to meet the state's new member Quota:

1) Recruit!

If those 45 Councils who haven't recruited yet had just one new member, we'd be ahead of our YTD goal!

The Order's new outreach program to recruit new members is called "Fishers of Men / Renewing our Culture of Invitation". You can download a guidebook here https://dbcimages.blob.core.windows.net/item-media/14825345/c49892f1-e456-49ed-bc92-7acec78ca5e5.pdf I strongly urge you to download it and review it. It's a powerful

resource to help you and your council develop a great program of one-on-one invitations for the men of your parish.

I encourage Grand Knights and Council Membership Chairmen to support this invitation process by giving recognition to those members who've made that invitation to someone to join the Knights. Put the inviters' names in your newsletters, incentivize the process - maybe with something from Knights Gear like a mug. Just make it a Council priority.

If each Knight asks 4 men a year to join the Order, and only one of them says yes, you'll still double the size of your council. If you don't ask, you don't grow!

2) Round Table Development!

Bl. Fr. McGivney's vision was to have a Knights of Columbus council in every Parish. We recognize that not every parish can support a council of its own, so we are rephrasing that to have a Knights of Columbus presence in every parish. A Roundtable can accomplish that, and it connects your Council to a nearby parish with no council. It provides the Pastor with manpower and leadership for programs he selects. It gives their men the opportunity to join and get all the benefits of the Order. And it gives you a new recruitment point! It can also grow into a new Council if the parish is large enough to sustain it.

We currently have 5 Round Tables active in the State. Our Quota is 15 and I'm sure there are opportunities for many more.

3) New Council Development!

Experience is that a parish with over 200 families is a good candidate to sustain its own council. We have many of those all over the state. 3 new Councils would really help us make our Quota, and we have several in progress.

As we form a District by District plan, I ask the DDs and GKs to please be receptive and open to ways that you can help grow the Order.

At the recent Midyear Meeting, I was honored to have Rick present me with the award and pin it on my lapel. As you can see on the website the qualifying activities are things that most of our councils are already participating in. I'd love to see more people wearing star shaped pins to encourage others to join in these activities!

Quote of the Day

Circle of Honor is for states the equivalent of Star Council for councils.

Two of the metrics for the Circle of Honor are the performance of Councils in filling out Supreme Forms, and the number of Star Councils. We know there are many councils out there who could qualify for Star Council, but they don't get it, just because they didn't submit their required forms. When we ask why, some say "we're not doing it for the awards".

Our State Chaplain, Fr. John List, shared a scripture passage with us at the Midyear meeting that's particularly appropriate for this. Matthew 5 starts with the Sermon on the Mount and tells us we are the Salt of the Earth and the Light of the World. 5:16 says "In the same way, your light must shine so that it can be seen by others; this will enable them to observe your good works and give praise to your Father in heaven."

Happy Advent! And may you have a Merry Christmas and Happy New year as we complete the month of December. There is still time to recruit this year, do your part to make a fellow parishioner a Knight before Christmas. Remember the code BLESSEDMCGIVNEY to let them join online for free.

For those who have turned in their Form 365 (Service Program Personnel Report), Thank You. Please watch for the invitation from Praesidium Academy to meet the Safe Environment Training for those who need to complete this training. If you have completed this training in the last 2 years, the training is good for three years.

Reports as of today still show a lot of councils not submitting their 185 or 365 successfully. This can result from either not submitting at all, or not filling in one of the required positions. These could be Youth Protection required Directors or your Membership Director as that position also needs to be filled for the 365 to be complete. Please review your status and add those missing position assignments.

We need to achieve our "Safe Environment Training" goals. This means, Grand Knight, Program Director, Family Director, and Community Director need to complete the training. If you have completed this training in the last three years, you are good to go. It is on line training and takes


about an hour to complete. The Councils that sponsor youth events like Free Throw Competitions, Soccer Challenge, Keep Christ in Christmas Poster, eta. "Safe Environment Training" (SET) is a must. You must have at least two SET Knights at these events (one must have a background check). If you cannot meet this requirement, you should not conduct this event. The same requirement is for youth helping you in your events (Fish fries, pancake breakfast, chicken cooks).

Gather that information for the Fraternal Survey, the 1728 will be due in January and your Financial Secretary will need that info to fill out the form with any accuracy. This form not only helps us capture the scope of efforts by our Knights but also helps us comply with requirements from the US Government to maintain our tax-exempt status so get that data in.

Resolutions for the State Convention will need to be submitted in the next few months so take some time to consider if your council will submit one and get started on writing it up. We review them at the State convention and there is some work to be done before that time so we typically finish them up mid-February and collect the required signatures at that point. The actual deadlines should be available in the January.



Fourth Degree Knights Purpose

The primary purpose of the Fourth Degree is to foster the spirit of patriotism by promoting responsible citizenship and a love of and loyalty to the Knights' respective countries through active membership in local Fourth Degree groups called assemblies. Fourth Degree members must retain their membership as Third Degree members in the local council to remain in good standing.

Color Corps

The Color Corps is an elective division of the Fourth Degree, whose distinctive presence in parades, wreath-laying ceremonies, Confirmations and other Catholic functions is a visible reminder of our service to the community. The ceremonial sword symbolizes Christian Knighthood, and is carried to signify reverence to Church, Eucharist, country and freedom. The Color Corps uniform is ordered through the website KofCuniform.com. Swords are sold separately from The English Company.

Membership

The Fourth Degree ritual added patriotism to the three original principles of the Order: charity, unity and fraternity. Any Third Degree member in good standing, with at least six months membership in the order, is eligible for membership in the Fourth Degree. 


